Read or Tell a Story

- » Read or tell a story to your child each day. This could be a different picture book, a chapter from a chapter book, or a story told by the adult that is either fiction or non-fiction.
- » Have your child read you a story or tell you a story. Ask them to identify the beginning, middle, and end of the story they read or told.
- » Choose any book. Look at the cover and read the title. Ask your child to predict what the story might be about. Read the story. Check your child's predictions.
- » Have your child read a book to themselves. Then have them do a book talk to others trying to convince them to read book.
- » Read two books by the same author. Compare and contrast the books.
- » After reading any simple picture book, turn it into a play and act it out.
- » Ask your child to tell you a story. Be sure they describe the characters, setting, problem and solution.

Reading response options:

- » verbalize responses
- » draw pictures
- » act out the story
- » point to pictures that show beginning, middle, and end

Ways to practice fluency:

- » adult can read a part first and the student will echo read
- » adult and student can read the selection at the same time
- » adult and student can take turns reading phrases, sentences, paragraphs, or pages
- » after adult models reading the passage/section, student can read aloud the same text multiple times
