Compound Sentences

Compound sentences are formed by joining two independent but related clauses. The clauses are joined by **coordinating conjunctions.** The new sentence expresses the combined sense of both independent clauses.

Using compound sentences can make your writing more interesting. Read the following example.

You can sit by the pool. I will go for a swim.

Now look at it written as a compound sentence.

You can sit by the pool, but I will go for a swim.

Notice that the conjunction adds more meaning about how the two ideas are related.
