# **Similes**


A **simile** compares two unlike things using the connecting word *like* or *as*. Authors use similes to describe images or ideas that might otherwise be difficult to understand.

Here is an example of a simile.

The girl was like sugar whenever her grandmother came to stay.



In this simile, the girl is being compared to sugar. Why would the author want to compare the girl to sugar? See how a student used a word web to help her understand the meaning of the simile.



<u>I think the author is trying to say that the little girl was sweet and pleasing</u> whenever her grandmother came to stay.


