DECEMBER 2018

PE NEWS - MR. OSWEILER

We have done the first Pacer and Half-mile test of the year. This year differs from past years in the grading on these tests. Students are simply graded MET, or NOT YET, in regards to their standard grades. The students will have two more opportunities through the school year to meet the standard if they did not meet it in the first trimester. The students are told that the best way to improve on these tests is to increase their heart rate and exercise throughout the school year. I only see students 45-minutes every third day, not enough time to accomplish the results that we desire. I stress that all students get active in their daily lives with physical activities after school and on weekends. This can be done in many ways, including jogging, riding their bikes, playing outside with friends and family.

In the coming months we will be working on several tasks that address the students' motor skills. This will include proper overhand throwing form. This skill is one that many of the students struggle with. We start slowly going through the fundamentals of throwing and progress to accuracy. Any opportunity that your student has to practice throwing, they should take it.

As Winter has arrived, I ask that all students have sneakers available at school to change into from snow boots. Students will not be allowed to participate in physical education classes if they do not have sneakers because of the risk of injury to them and others. Students will be allowed to borrow school owned sneakers 2 to 3 times, after which reminders will be sent home.

ATTENDANCE REMINDERS - FROM THE MAIN OFFICE

- When possible, please avoid scheduling appointments for your child during the school day or at a time requiring an early dismissal for your child.
- A note from the appropriate doctor confirming medical appointments requiring your child to miss school time should be sent to the main office after the visit.
- If an early dismissal is unavoidable, please provide a note to your child's teacher to alert him/her of your intent to call for your child early. This allows the teacher to plan and prepare materials and to have your child ready to go upon your arrival.
- Early dismissals requested for the convenience of parents/guardians are not considered "Excused" and will be counted as "Unexcused" according to District policy.

BIRTHDAY TREAT POLICY REMEMBER - NO FLOWERS OR BALLOONS ARE ALLOWED IN CLASSROOMS

<u>The safety of our children is of utmost importance, please remember that edible treats are not an option</u> <u>for birthdays.</u>

We have many students with a wide range of severe, life threatening allergies to various nuts, milk products, wheat, soy, strawberries, kiwi, and much more. Although we are very diligent about monitoring items it is exceedingly difficult to verify the ingredients in any food product.

Non-Edible Birthday treat suggestions:

- *Donate a book to the school library or classroom in honor of your child's birthday.
- *Have your child bring their favorite book to share; the teacher or child may read it to the class.
- *Donate a ball, jump rope or game to the classroom for recess.
- *Provide each student in class with a colorful pencil, sticker, eraser, bookmark or chalk.

Recognition of birthdays or other special events with the delivery of flowers, balloons, or stuffed animals is not encouraged. If items do arrive for students they will be kept in the office until the end of the school day.

CONNECTING WITH MRS. FRANNIE SMITH

Connection Specialist

Teachers must be skilled at listening to their students as well as explaining things clearly. They must be able to adapt their methods of communication to all students regardless of ability or learning style. They are able to "read" their students and adapt to the needs of the individual. Teachers also appreciate this type of clear communication with parents, please feel free to talk with teachers with not only concerns, but also the positives in your child's life.

Ongoing research shows that family engagement in schools improves student achievement, reduces absenteeism, and restores parents' confidence in their children's education. Students with involved parents or other caregivers earn higher grades and test scores, have better social skills, and show improved behavior.

LUNCH REMINDERS

Marshall continues to be a part of the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), a FREE lunch and breakfast program. This funding is from both the federal and state level governments and allows our students to qualify regardless of family income. Families are required to complete the form during online registration. If you feel you did not complete the form, please call the office.

Milk is only free when it is part of the complete hot or cold lunch provided by the school district.

If a student brings a packed lunch from home and drinks a milk provided by Marshall, the milk is not free to the student. The cost will be \$.55 per carton. Families may bank money in a student lunch account to use for future milk purchases, or pay daily for the milk.

DROP OFF AND PICK UP OF STUDENTS

Parents and guardians we appreciate you continuing to be careful drivers and walkers with our students back in school. We know Marshall does not have a perfect area for students to be dropped off before heading for the courtyard and their lineup. Please make sure you and your students use the marked crosswalks that are monitored by Marshall staff. Please watch for the cones that mark off safe zones in the street and do not park in the crosswalk areas making it dangerous for students and staff.

Thank you for your help, student safety is important in and out of the building!
