## Counselor Corner...Mrs. Boeve

Greetings! This month during guidance lessons, grades have reviewed Body Safety: our body is ours, *No-Go-Yell-Tell* steps if faced with an uncomfortable situation or touch, and identifying their 5 trusted adults that they feel safe going to with any problem. Explicit teaching about body safety (traditionally known as "good touch, bad touch") is vital to protect children and empowering them with knowledge on what to do if faced with a dangerous situation such as inappropriate touching or harm. These lessons also built off of what students learned in Health lessons earlier in November with classroom teachers. Students in lower grade levels (K-3) read stories and had insightful conversations surrounding body safety. Students in upper grade levels reviewed body safety and participated in activities engaging one another in a safety plan and "what would you do" if faced with an uncomfortable situation.
