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NOTES FROM MR. JOHLL

Dear Roosevelt Families,

I hope this newsletter finds your family enjoying this warm and beautiful March weather. Below are a few important pieces of information to share with our families as we end this month and quickly approach April.

UNPLUGGED DAY | Are you aware that there is a national 'Unplugged Day' happening this year on April 17. Our district will be participating in this day. As you know, we have students place their cell phones in their lockers or book bags from the start of the school day until dismissal, so we are "unplugged" from cell phones every day at Roosevelt. With that said, we will have announcements at school, and information will be shared on monitors about the importance of unplugging from time to time. We will encourage students (and adults) to disconnect from digital devices and reconnect with the world around them—and the importance of doing so as much as possible each day! In today's technology-driven society, we are often glued to our screens. Without the constant distraction of phones, we might find more time to focus on hobbies, reading, or simply enjoying the quiet moments of life.

ISASP | In April we will be administering the annual Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP) tests. These are standardized assessments that have been developed by Iowa Testing Programs at the University of Iowa. These REQUIRED tests have been developed specifically for students in our state. They are directly aligned with the Iowa Core standards in reading, math, and science. The information gleaned from these tests provide teachers, students, and parents, with a clear and accurate assessment of learning as it relates to those core standards. Therefore, these tests are very important in helping your child(ren) with their growth in learning here at Roosevelt. Your words of encouragement and your help in promoting the importance of these test is very much needed and appreciated.

Students will use their school issued laptops to take the tests on our secure server network. Students will take the test in the morning. More information will be coming in a Parent Square message, but here are the dates for testing:

Wednesday, April 9	Math

ID AND LANYARD | Does your child still have her/his school issued student identification (ID) card and lanyard? To provide a safe learning environment for all students at Roosevelt, we do require our students to wear their ID in a visible way at school. (This is true for all secondary schools in Dubuque.) As we continue with the third trimester of the school year, we are beginning to see an increase in the number of students without an identification card. Please remind your child(ren) that wearing the ID card in a visible way is an important part of our safety plan at Roosevelt. It's also important for checking out library books, purchasing school lunches, purchasing tickets for dances or PBIS events, etc. If your child(ren) needs a replacement card, please ask them to come to the main office to purchase a new one. The cost for a new ID card is \$3.00. We also sell lanyards for \$2.00, if one is needed.


PARENT TEACHER CONFERENCES | Thank you to everyone that attended our second round of parent-teacher conferences this month. We appreciate you taking the time to learn about what is happening here at school. We know that these conversations will help promote learning success.

RESILIENCE | Finally, I want to share with you a powerful website that I have used as an educator and parent, focused on the importance of building resiliency from the American Psychological Association (APA). It is a favorite website and I like to share it with others. As you know, resiliency is the ability to adapt positively when faced with difficult situations, adversity, or even failure. It's the ability to effectively work through tough times. We strive to help students build this ability here at Roosevelt. Within this website, you will find a great article, "Resilience Guide for Parents and Teachers." In the article, the APA provides ten tips that can help develop resilience in our middle school students. They are:

1. Make connections
2. Help your child by having them help others
3. Maintain a daily routine
4. Take a break
5. Teach your child self-care
6. Move toward your goals
7. Nurture a positive self-view
8. Keep things in perspective and maintain a hopeful outlook
9. Look for opportunities for self-discovery
10. Accept that change is a part of living

Each of these ten tips has wonderful suggestions that go with them in the article. There is also a section in the article devoted to middle school students. I particularly like the information shared about reinforcing the importance of empathy. ERMS ATTENDANCE PROCEDURE

If your child(ren) will be out for an extended period of time for a non-illness reason such as a family trip, we ask that you please provide notification to the office a minimum of one week in advance of the first day of absence. There are three options for communicating this with the main office:

1. You can send a note with your child, OR
2. You can call the attendance line at 563-552-5012, OR
3. You can send an email to ermsattendance@dbqschools.org

Please include the student name, the dates of the absence and the reason. The student will then receive a letter from the Main Office to be reviewed by each of their teachers so that they are informed of the dates.

ERMS Attendance procedure for pick up during school hours...

Option 1 (Best procedure for your convenience): Send a note with your student in the morning.

- The note should include: student's name, pick-up time, reason for leaving early, and parent's signature.
- The student should bring that note to the main office first thing in the morning. He or she will be given a pass out of class in exchange for the note.
- Then your student will meet you at the east door by the flag pole and can come out when you pull up to the curb.

Option 2: If you know in advance that your child will miss school you can send an email to [**ermsattendance@dbqschools.org**](mailto:ermsattendance@dbqschools.org). Please include your child's name, pick-up time and reason for leaving early.

If you need to pick up your student due to a last-minute situation, call the attendance line at **552-5012**. If we received the information through a phone call, then you have to meet your student in the building. When picking up your student, you will need to enter the building through the door by the flag pole. Then check in with the secretary at the window. **Please notify us as early in the day as possible so that we can better serve you.**

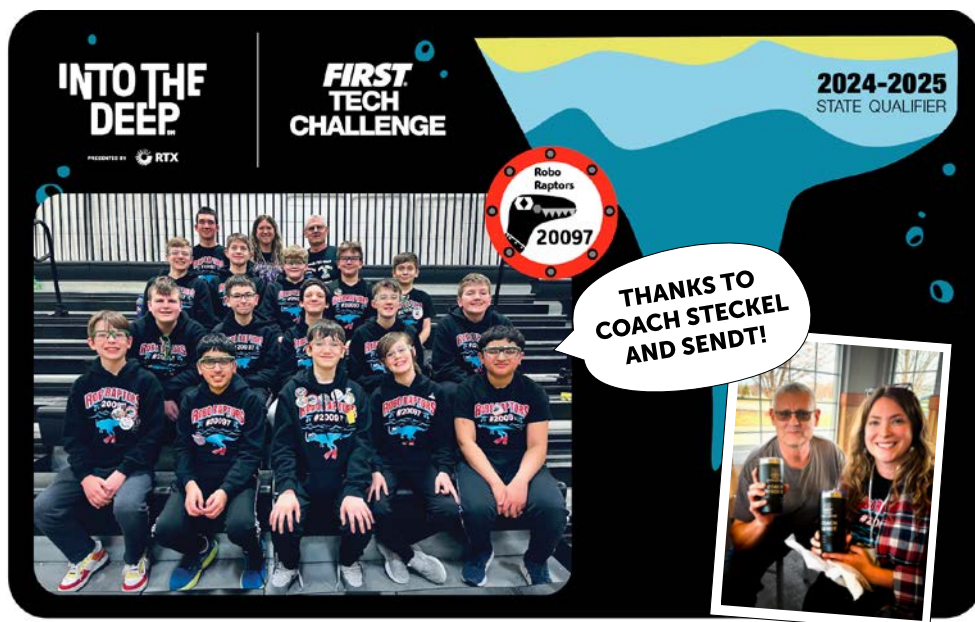

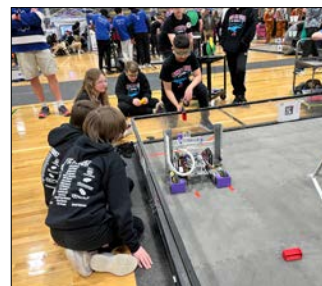
FTC: STATE COMPETITORS

On Friday, February 28th and Saturday, March 1st, our FTC team, the Robo Raptors competed at the FIRST Tech Challenge Iowa Championship held at the Xstream Arena and Green State Family Fieldhouse in Coralville, IA.

A total of 72 teams converged for the robotics competition from across Iowa. The majority of teams were comprised of high school students. Less than 10 of those competing were middle schools teams, including our Robo Raptors!



Robo Raptor Booth



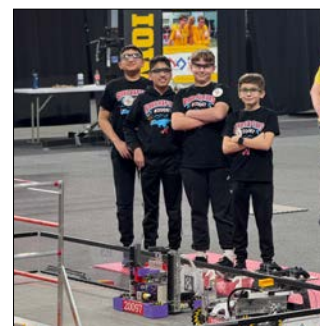

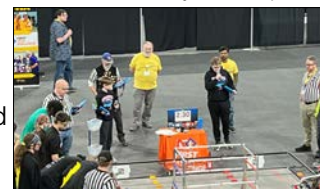

HOW IT WORKS | Each team competing must host a team booth, present an Engineering Portfolio, complete a Judges Review and compete in Robot Matches. The robotic matches are divided into two divisions (Gold and Black) where teams must each compete in six Qualifier Matches, then the top teams participate in Alliance Selections and then in double elimination playoff matches. The winning alliances from each division playoffs then proceed to the final championship match to determine who will advance to represent Iowa in the worlds competition.

The Robo Raptors received their highest marks ever on their engineering portfolio and had a great review with the judges. They were able to clearly communicate their engineering design process, team dynamics, outreach activities, what they learned throughout the season and much more. Two of our Robo Raptors were also invited to emcee on the big stage during the state Qualifier Matches.
