School Principal News!

Hello Eisenhower Families,

Greetings and I hope this finds you all well! April is thankfully upon us and we are in that powerful homestretch of the school year where all of the hard work from this year is paying off. Teachers are busy utilizing that extra 25 minutes at the end of each day to provide re-teaching and extensions of the grade level standards and to make up some of the lost instructional time from the brutal winter that resulted in so many canceled school days. Thank you again for your patience following that revised school-day schedule.

Now that we are back from spring break, it's great to get into a routine and make the best of each and every day. We appreciate that you continue to make school a priority and ensure your student is here every possible day on time and ready to learn. When your child is late or absent, it does affect their learning. Thanks for keeping us informed when illness or special circumstances come up.

Currently we are in the midst of giving our 3rd-5th grade students the new state assessment, the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP). This replaces the previous test, the ITP. There are only 3 or 4 days of testing for this and students are assessed in the areas of Reading, Math, and Language/Writing (and Science for 5th grade only). With the testing taking place in the spring window due to state directives, we won't be receiving the results back until the start of the next school year. Upcoming we also have the spring FAST language arts assessment for students in Kindergarten-5th grade taking place April 25 and 26. This is a brief, 5 minute reading screening that students take three times each year. Following that, spring MAP testing will take place between April 29 and May 17. You will receive results of both of the MAP and FAST assessments at the end of the school year. Please encourage your child to work hard and take these spring assessments seriously, as we use this data to make important educational decisions and it allows us to see the great academic growth they have made this year. It is quite a bit of assessment all taking place within a relatively short period of time but rest assured that good instruction is also taking place and teachers look for opportunities to keep school fun and engaging!

Our Kindergarten Welcome events will take place on April 23rd and 25th from 5:30-7:00 p.m. in our gym. Those with last names starting with A-L should attend on the 23rd and M-Z should come on the 25th. If you have a conflict on your scheduled night, feel free to come on the other evening. If you know of anyone who has not already received information from Eisenhower or the school district and who is living in the Eisenhower district and has a child turning 5 years old on or before September 15, 2019, please encourage them to contact our main office at 563-552-3500. We look forward to welcoming a new incoming kindergarten class!

The last couple of months of school will be busy so keep an eye on our calendar for upcoming events. We will have our annual "book swap" on April 18, sponsored by the Eisenhower PTO. You can send in books to be included in the swap any day from April 12-17.

The PTO is also sponsoring a marker recycling program so if you have any dried out markers at home, you can send them to school instead of sending them to the landfill and we'll be happy to send them in to be recycled. Thanks to the PTO for this green initiative!

Strep Throat Information and Warning

March has been a busy month here in the health office. Starting at the beginning of March, we have had many students in with strep throat as well as influenza A. As many of you know, strep throat is caused by a bacterial infection, so if you go to the doctor and have your child checked for strep and it comes back positive, the doctor will prescribe an antibiotic and in 24 hours your child will feel better. (Antibiotics are not effective for viral infections) What you might not know though, is that strep throat will go away on its own even if is not treated, however untreated or under-treated (not taking the medication for the full time it is ordered--either 10 days or until gone) strep throat can cause very serious complications, such as kidney inflammation or rheumatic fever. Rheumatic fever can lead to painful and inflamed joints, a specific type of rash, or heart valve damage. These complications can end up causing a lifetime of chronic disease.

Strep throat is most common in children, but it affects people of all ages. Symptoms of strep are:

- Throat pain that usually comes on quickly
- Painful swallowing
- Red and swollen tonsils, sometimes with white patches or streaks of pus
- Tiny red spots on the area at the back of the roof of the mouth (soft or hard palate)
- Swollen, tender lymph nodes in your neck
- Fever
- Headache
- Rash
- Nausea or vomiting, especially in younger children
- Body aches

Notice that *symptoms for young children is nausea and vomiting. Many times they do not even say their throat is sore*, but if you check it, you will see that it is red. It is also possible to have many of these signs and symptoms, but not have strep throat. The cause of these signs and symptoms could be a viral infection or some other illness. That is generally why your doctor does a throat swab to test specifically for strep throat.

If your child has any of the following signs or symptoms, it is recommended that you check with your doctor:

- A sore throat accompanied by tender, swollen lymph glands
- A sore throat that lasts longer than 48 hours
- A fever
- A sore throat accompanied by a rash
- Problems breathing or swallowing
- If strep has been diagnosed, a lack of improvement after taking antibiotics for 48 hours

If you think your child might have strep throat, it is wise to have them checked by a doctor to be sure to prevent any of these serious complications from occurring. If you are without insurance to cover the cost of an office visit, please contact the health office at school (552-3484). There are funds that will cover a visit for you. Note: It is better to request these funds <u>before</u> the office visit occurs.
